There was meticulous period research, but this did not read like a history book; instead it is a superb thriller you can't put down. This period in US history was certainly tainted with the likes of J. Edgar Hoover and Joseph McCarthy. As I rooted for those "few" who took on J. Edgar Hoover with right and might; I cried for the many like the Rosenbergs, the Scottsboro Boys, and Martin Luther King. Illustrated and includes bibliographical references (p. 198-219) and index. Highly recommended for high school students.

At the end of the book, there is a contact list of organizations concerned with the issues discussed, sources for further reading and an index.

Cursory text will generally limit appeal and usefulness to upper elementary and lower middle school readers. An attractive layout features full color diagrams and photographs, maps, fact boxes, and highlighted "vocabulary words." Also included: Glossary, Read More (reference to other topical books), Internet Sites (including a proprietary code to a website identified as "safe"), and an index.

Well-written story about a small shorebird that migrates 18,000 miles each year, Hoose followed B95, a Rufa Red Knot affectionately nicknamed "Moonbird" because in this bird's amazingly long lifespan (20 years!) he has flown the distance equivalent to the moon and halfway back! Interesting stories, facts, maps, and pictures help the reader understand the plight of these small birds that are endangered because of habitat destruction. A "What You Can Do" section includes what readers can do right now to get involved. The book profiles Mike Hudson whose grandfather encouraged his love of birds from the time he was five-years-old. At the time of the writing, Mike was fifteen and had already founded a group called "Friends of the Knot" that drafted letters, wrote petitions, and even spoke in front of the Delaware Department of Natural Resources. His efforts succeeded in getting the Red Knot listed as an endangered species. Amazing story!

I followed this story as reported in *The Philadelphia Inquirer* and was delighted to see attention called to the plight of the Rufa Red Knot (a small shorebird) in this beautiful book. Hoose, a multiple award-winning author (Newbery, YALSA, National Book Award) and conservationist, joined an international team of scientists studying this bird's diminishing numbers over a period of years. The Red Knot migrates the unbelievable distance from Terra Del Fuego at the southern tip of South America to the Canadian Arctic annually. The nickname "Moonbird" was given when they tagged a single bird, B95, and discovered the astonishing number of years the bird lives. As a result, it was determined that the Red Knot flies approximately the distance of the moon and back during its lifetime! The Red Knot makes a crucial stop along the Jersey shore for protein-rich horseshoe crab eggs. Could climate and other environmental changes be responsible for the dwindling quantity of this food supply and the remarkable bird? *Moonbird* is one *The Washington Post*'s Best Kids Books of 2012 and also won the 2012 Robert F. Sibert Informational Book Honor.

The text and photographs are gruesome enough to attract the interest of middle-schoolers, but the book also contains enough science to make it genuinely educational. Forensic anthropologist Dr. Elizabeth A. Murray explains the many methods that forensic scientists use to identify corpses, which may be found in various stages of decomposition and are sometimes merely bones. After positively identifying a body, the scientists and law enforcement officials can use this information to facilitate determining cause of death, which often leads to solving crimes. Some fascinating case studies are profiled, and the book includes a bibliography and index. Interesting reading and terrific for research. One small criticism is that the picture captions use small red font on a black background, which makes them difficult to read.

Each short chapter integrates images of the people, places, and events being described to enhance the reader's understanding of this horrific event. In addition to the main focus of Lincoln's death and its aftermath, O'Reilly also includes information about the flags of the Union and Confederacy during the Civil War, major players in both the Civil War and Lincoln's assassination and what happened to them following the assassination, the Lincoln family, facts about the Civil War, medicine and weapons of the time, a walk through Washington D.C. during Lincoln's presidency, timelines, and additional information for reading and research about both the Civil War and President Lincoln. She not only helps her players, but also helps their families learn how to confront issues of race, language barriers, and poverty positively and in a way that opens doors and is strengthened through education. Each chapter shares the story of a different player or players and how Luma's guidance and kindness not only led to a successful soccer experience, but also a successful transition from a war-torn country to life in Clarkston, GA. She mails money and supply boxes to lodges along the way. The 1200 miles that she traverses takes her from California, through Oregon, Nevada and Washington. She meets people along the way and battles all kinds of problems on the way to rediscovering herself. Readers will be thoroughly engaged in Cheryl's story, each step she took, each monumental moment she encountered along the trail. I laughed with her; I cried with her, but most of all I cheered with/for her.

In 1996 a discovery was made that changed the understanding of the history and development of man. During a boat race on the Columbia River in Washington bones were discovered dating back over 9,500 years to Paleoamerica and Native American inhabitants. Through forensic science and anthropological studies, the bones, "Kennewick Man", tell the story of the first inhabitants of what is now the United States. This discovery challenged forensic scientists and forensic practices to learn about how Paleoamericans lived. With information from other, less complete, Paleoamerican skeletons, scientists were able to build the story and development of man, not only 9,500 years ago, but also today. *Their Skeletons Speak* not only shares the story of the discovery and science behind Kennewick Man, but also the development of Native Americans and their culture, along with information about earlier Paleoamerican beings. The integration of photographs, sketches, and diagrams only adds to the story of Kennewick Man and the history and story his bones provide today. This is a great Common Core piece because it connects science, history, anthropology, and sociology, while also challenging the reader with scientific jargon and an understanding of prehistoric man.

School librarians rejoice! Carrie Russell is back with a long-awaited follow-up to 2004's *Complete Copyright: An Everyday Guide for Librarians*, but now with a focus on the K-12 landscape. Be aware that there are not many simple solutions to copyright dilemmas offered here, since fair use analysis requires considering several factors at once, but you'll be confident in making fair use determinations after you finish reading this book. Russell covers many common questions: "Can I scan book chapters and put them online for my students?", "Can I convert all the library's VHS tapes to DVD?", and "Can I make copies of videos on YouTube to get around our school filter?" are all here, along with many other pressing questions. And her clear prose should provide relief to teachers and librarians who have been too scared of legal liability to open the seeming Pandora's box of copyright.
